As a lifetime New Yorker, much of it spent in Westchester County, I am excited to be starting a new life chapter in the Berkshires as part of the Hevreh community. Early childhood education is a second career for me - the first being in health care policy and planning. LIBRARY NEWS

What better way to get ready for the New Year than to revive your "Basic Judaism"? We actually have a category for that, and here's one book, a BIG compendium, to help you on your way.

Jewish Literacy by Rabbi Joseph Telushkin first appeared in 1991, and was reissued in 2001. In over 700 pages, Rabbi Telushkin covers everything from History and Contemporary Life, to Beliefs, Ethics and Rituals, Jewish Holidays, and Life Cycle. As the book jacket states, "Authoritative and rigorously scholarly—yet leavened with folklore, anecdotes, and humor—Jewish Literacy is 'the book' for anyone seeking a better understanding of Judaism."

In other words, this book contains "The Most Important Things to Know About the Jewish Religion, Its People, and Its History." The organization into 15 Parts is helpful. Each part contains discussions pertinent to its title. For example, Part 1, Bible, includes a discussion of *Tanakh*, or Torah, and entries on the 5 Books of Moses, plus entries on the Early Prophets, the Later Prophets, and the Ketuvim or Writings.

A tour through history, from the *Mishna* and the *Talmud*, through the Medieval Period to the Modern Period, Zionism, Israel and the Holocaust, brings us to Part 8, American-Jewish Life. This part is intriguing. It begins with a discussion of George Washington's Letter to the Jews of Newport, Rhode Island, 1790, and continues with thumbnail sketches of such Jewish figures as Henrietta Szold, Louis Brandeis, Albert Einstein, and Rabbi Soloveitchik, among others.

After covering Soviet Jewry, Antisemitism, and Jewish Texts, Part 12 presents over 40 entries on Jewish Ethics and Basic Beliefs. It is interesting to read Telushkin's commentary on such Commandments as "Do not put a stumbling block in front of a blind man," "Justice, Justice you shall pursue," or the Commandments around redeeming captives.

The book continues with Parts on The Hebrew Calendar and Jewish Holidays, and Life Cycle, and concludes with Part 15, Synagogue and Prayers. This is timely: it explains not only the idea of the Temple/Synagogue/Shul but also the Service and the Siddur in accessible language. Appropriately, Jewish *Literacy* concludes with a discussion of Blessings. Telushkin writes, "The word for blessing in Hebrew is *brakha*, which comes from the word berekh, meaning 'knee'; thus, the word suggests a bended knee, the proper posture for one who is approaching God." And he ends this massive study with the Shehekhiyanu: "Blessed are You, Eternal our God, for granting us life, sustaining us, and enabling us to reach this day." A fitting conclusion to this book, and a good start for our entry into the High Holy Days and the Jewish New Year. In his book The Ten Commandments: From the Shadow of Eden to the Promise of Canaan, Rabbi Dennis Ross explains, "Judaism is a world-engaging religion—the road to spiritual truth is not taken in isolation but by looking outward. We reach spiritual truth by engaging with the world, the family, and the community." May we experience this unity in ourselves, our family and friends as we embark together on our journey. THE DRUZE: A CRUCIAL ETHNIC/RELIGIOUS ISRAELI MINORITY

SPECIAL LUNCH N' LEARN WITH HEVREH MEMBER BENNY BARAK

The discussion will focus on the historical inception, early in the eleventh century, of the Druze as a separate people with a separate secret religion. The program will also consider how during Israel's war of Independence, the Druze supported the IDF, became part of Israel's military draft (only the men), as well as how their highly successful integration in Israeli society lead them to be among the most trust-worthy Israelis in present-day Israeli society.



Dr. Benny Barak is Professor Emeritus of Marketing and International Business at the Zarb School of Business of Hofstra University. Prior to academe he served as a career officer in the IDF in the 1960s which lead to his first personal acquaintance with the Druze.

THE BOOK OF JUDGES

We have something good going on: weekly lunch n' learn sessions with Rabbi Hirsch. This group meets in the library each week to wrestle with provocative biblical text. It's a story of one people encountering others, the tensions that exist between those parties, and the complicated, ongoing relationship of a Covenantal Nation with its God.

HEVREH'S BOARD OF TRUSTEES REPORT

As we enter the High Holidays, Hevreh's Board members are looking back at a year of achievement and looking forward to a year of fulfilling our goals. This summer, we celebrated Shelley Rolf and her caring involvement with Hevreh over many years. Part of that celebration was a fund-raising picnic and gift-basket raffle in which we raised money both for general operations and for the Tzedek fund. Thank you to all who made this possible by working to make it happen, and all who attended. We are now planning next year's event, and invite your suggestions. As you can see by the remodeling of classrooms in the classroom wing, we have been preparing for the opening of our Early Childhood Center. We have a director, Ellen Marcus, who brings her experience in similar schools to us from New York. We hope to open near the beginning of 2020. The ritual committee, working with the Rabbis, has been reviewing how

we approach Shabbat. Thank you to all who have responded to the survey.

The security task force has been reviewing our preparedness for threatening events. This is a difficult issue with no clear-cut solutions, but there are many small steps we are taking to improve our readiness, including training for staff, teachers, and others who want to participate. We are working with the Jewish Federation of the Berkshires on this, along with SCN, the Secure Communities Network, and through them the ADL and government agencies.

The major responsibility of the Board of Trustees is to guide the course that Hevreh takes and ensure that we have the funds to get there. We want to continue to provide spiritual, educational, and social programs that define and enrich our community and support the greater community in which

we live. Our focus has been to create a community that is an open and inclusive center for Jewish learning and social action guided by that learning. At the same time we need to keep membership dues affordable. Doing this requires the involvement of the whole community - not just through financial support but also by participation. There are many active committees that welcome your input and participation; WeEngage for outreach and membership, Ritual for framing how we approach God, Social Action for extending our obligation for Tikkun Olam across the wider community, and the House committee for the care of our building and grounds. Please get involved, please tell us what you want to see, and please enjoy the benefits of our community.

LANDSCAPING REPORT

Hevreh's beautiful gardens and landscaping are getting a makeover.

The House Committee established a garden committee this year to survey our landscape and determine what we needed to keep our plants, trees and shrubs flourishing in the coming years. With the assistance of Carol Beyer and Marion Adler, co-chairs of the original Tu B-Shevat Committee, we reached out to Tom Ingersoll, certified arborist, and David Valbracht, landscape architect, who provided the original designs. They were delighted to return to Hevreh to help us and quickly surveyed our property.

This past spring, Tom's crews pruned many of our trees, including the Sargentii Cherries, Japanese Katsura, Sugar Maples, Red Oak, Red Maple, Callery Pear, and Hemlocks. Climbing grapevine was cut and removed.

Removal of some dead trees and invasive plants is scheduled for the area at the end of the main parking lot.

David Valbracht produced a new plan for the large oval and planters around the main entrance to Hevreh. With the help of Hevreh volunteers, more than 80 flowering perennials and shrubs were planted. Please enjoy the Hydrangea, Spirea, Inkberries, Rhododendron, Mountain Laurel and Japanese Andromeda, Salvia, Liatris, Catmint, Shasta Daisy, Coneflower and Liatris. The goal is to create gardens that blend with all our existing plantings... junipers, Viburnam, Lilac, Serviceberries, Daylillies, Iris and Anemone, and to provide flowers from spring to fall.

The garden committee has also begun to prune our existing shrubs, water all the plants and trees, mulch the trees and garden beds, and establish a compost area. Dave Halley, Peter Gale, Jan and Rik Kabel, Marion Adler and Gail Grollman all helped with the planning and pitched in "on the ground" to plant, prune and water the plants. A special thank you goes to Suzanne Sawyer for all her efforts over the past few years.

More work is planned: Over the fall and spring we will remove invasive plant species and dead shrubs, fertilize all plants and trees, and establish a pollinator garden.

The Board and donors provided the funds needed for professional consulting and the purchase of plants and shrubs. The hard work of our volunteers helped to keep costs down.

WEENGAGE COMMITTEE




